Version 6: Lords 24 uses version 6 of the basic rules

The Map: The map now includes India as well as Europe, Central Asia and Africa. I've greyed out repeated areas on the maps to make my life easier. However, this means some player nations are split across more than one map. I may increase the size of the main map but I'll have to think on this.

Tithes and Tribute: I think these are automatically updated by the stats program, so no need to declare them in your orders.

Control of the Papacy and Religious Orders: In Lords 24 we will not always have a player Pope (or Caliph etc for that matter) and the following rules are used to determine which player faction controls the Pope's actions, Papacy Rules. I've also added some stuff about gaining support from their armies

North America

The Atakapa Tribes

(Open Empire)

Nytah, Chief of the Atakapa



Chief Nytah, now well into his eighties, continued to rule from Atakapa. He was still able to father two children during these years by Queen Quiselpo. Settlers were gathered in Atakapa and led west to the empty Comanche lands by young Katkosh. After settling the province with Atakapans, Katkosh took a wife and travelled back to assist his father in Council affairs.

The Ute

(Open Empire)

White Stag, Chief of the Ute



Without White Stag to oversee the affairs of state, Ouray did a poor job of collecting tribute from the tribes. White Stag was forced to return to Ute to make sure this didn't happen again. He left his men with Black Hawk who let them loose on the poor Teton, looting and pillaging throughout the province.

The Huron Confederacy

(Open Empire)

Nanasuwara, Chief of the Hurons



Realising that his talents lay outside of the affairs of the tribes, Chief Monotan left Ossossane in the capable hands of the princes Nanasuwara and Nomino. Travelling west to the Ottawa lands with the able Negiundah, the Chief was able to persuade them to fully rejoin the Confederacy. He negotiated brides for his two sons and himself but sadly was to die in 1462 of a fever before he could consummate his marriage.

The Carib Tribes

(Open Empire)

Talin, Chief of the Carib



Chief Talin continued to rule from Carib with Guacanagarix and was to be blessed with a further four children by his extremely fertile Queen, Anacaona. More resources were sent to Ciguayo to clear the islands forests.

The Yokut Tribes

(Open Empire)

Babbling Brook, Chief of the Yokuts



The port of Ohlone was built in the bay to the north of Salinan. Giant Redwood remained in Salinan where he took a local Hohokam woman as his wife, His marriage to Blooming Flower was short as the veteran diplomat succumbed to a fever in early 1464. His efforts to gain more support from the Hohokam settled in Salinan proved fruitless. In Yoruk, Obsidian Knife was mauled by a bear while hunting in 1462 and killed by the beast. More shocking of the Yokut people was the death of Sea Lion in 1463. He had just fathered another daughter by Babbling Brook when his heart gave out. With no male heir the Yokut nation was in peril of disorder but Keen Eagle was to support Queen Babbling Brook as regent until her daughter could take the throne.

The Shoshone

(Open Empire)

Tondzaosha, Chief of the Shoshone



Chief Tondzaosha spent these years in Potlach with his growing family overseeing the affairs of the Shoshone. A grand funeral was arranged for his friend and longtime advisor Wirasup, whose sudden death was mourned by all. Trying to live up to his cousin's legacy, young Washakie was to tread the same route north. He was able to further explore the region of Chelan but could find no sign of any tribes. A great explorer, Washakie was no diplomat and his attempts to negotiate with the Cocalla proved fruitless.

The Nootka Tribes

(Open Empire)

Ko-ishin-mit, Winged Peacemaker of the Nuu-chab-nulth



Ko-ishin-mit was to spend these years ensuring that the Nootka people were well governed. More resources were spent on improving the lands of the Tolowa and the Tautin. The Chilicotin were persuaded to settle their remaining tribes in the province.

The Chipewan

(Open Empire)

Dlezi, Chief of the Chipewan



Chief Dlezi began to worry that Queen Nadlari was avoiding him as once again she was without child. He continued to rule from Cherawya and dispatched Mijtsaghi to Saskatchewan where he was able to persuade the tribes there to join the growing Chipewan nation.

The Cree

(Open Empire)

Mahihkan, Chief of the Cree



Chief Mahihkan ruled from Mistawasis and was blessed with another young son by Queen Nipisiy. Kahkewistahaw was to continue his negotiations with the Eppinette tribes and saw his efforts rewarded with their total allegiance. Despite his best efforts, Ahtahkakoop of the Maskegon was unable to gain any more support from the Chippewa.

The Echota

(Open Empire)

Taloe Sunkeeper, Chief of the Echota



Chief Taloe the Sunkeeper, travelled to Santua to gain some more influence with the migrating tribes on the province. He then returned to Yamasee where he was to take a young bride called Henoa as his wife. More resources were poured into clearing the lands of Chatot, Creek and Yuchi with the Chatot lands nearly cultivated.

The Moundbuilders

(Open Empire)

Untamek, Chief of the Moundbuilders

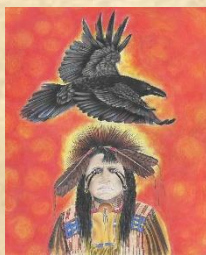


Young Chief Untamek continued to rule from Michigamea with the assistance of Prince Skythe and Bloodmoon. More ships were built in Cahokia and put to use in the Moundbuilders fishing fleet. In Saginaw, the tribes were to settle their lands at the bequest of Untamek. Katar travelled to Miami where he spent extensive negotiations with Chief Raven. Those negotiations saw Chief Raven swear full allegiance to Untamek's rule.

The Paiute

(Open Empire)

Numage, Chief of the Paiute



The lands of the Paviotso were cleared for farmland. Chief Numage travelled from Paviotso to the lands of the Gosiute where after years of negotiations was able to gain an alliance with the easterners.

The Hohokam

(Noble House)

Hokolesqua, Chief of the Hobokam



Chief Hokoquesqua of the Hohokam tribes sent Mato to the Ute port of Orabi to formally cede the region of Moache to them. He then travelled to the desert lands of Papago to ensure the Hohokam had no ties with those lands.

(Roman Catholic Civilised Religious Order)

Geoffrey, Hammer of God



Brother Fergus is sent west to negotiate with the Naskapi, Order Houses were also to be built in Iroquois and Malecite but no converts could be made in the wilds of Abenaki.

South America

The Chimu Kingdom of Chanchan

(Open Empire)

Illapa Puma, King of the Chimu



The King of the short-lived Moon Kingdom was brought before Illapa Puma and executed as an example to his subject; those subjects were now to be ruled directly from Chimu. Puma travelled to Moche where he returned to the affairs of state. He was to be blessed with a daughter by Queen Arauru shortly after his return. Waves of missionaries were sent north to root out any support for the Moon Cult. So effective were they that the city of Chiriqui was almost fully converted. To show his largesse, the wilds of Guayami were cleared for farmland and the prosperity of the province increased. Titu Manco travelled across the mountains to Uru where once again the province became an integral part of the kingdom. Viracocha Cucha returned south to Moquequa where the skilled diplomat was able to wring tribute out of the province. Yaku Wayna continued to support the king and was also to take command of the kingdom's fleet.

Chichen Itze

(Open Empire)

Korat, Chief of the Chichen Itze



King Korat was content to spend these years with his wife, Queen Quoraya. The royal couple were to expand their family by three more children. The city of Popolya in Popluca was expanded and its walls replaced. Prince Sorucanaya was left in charge of the kingdom's security and spent these years on patrol from Maya with Kaloraya and Charaya.

Zapotec Mitla

(Open Empire)

Monequiltia, Queen of the Zapotecs



Queen Monequiltia continued to rule with Prince Zaachila in Mitla. She was to have two more children during these years, surviving a difficult childbirth to produce a son who she named Cualli. Zaachila was to ensure the defence of the kingdom along with Chicaxoch while Mitzli and Chicahua were sent to Ncarao to persuade the province to rejoin the kingdom. Unfortunately, the diplomats were given misleading information by Zapotec agents and spent these years in vain.
